Activity 3 Making complex and difficult decisions

Activity instructions for ambassadors

Background

In all roles of nursing and midwifery, staff work as part of a team to make important and complex decisions. For example, a research nurse must screen patients for their eligibility to enter into a clinical trial.

This group activity demonstrates the complex decisions a research nurse would be involved in making, often when patients are critically ill.

The challenge

This activity is designed around a fictitious new drug, DrugX, which can help patients with respiratory conditions. The drug can only be given to patients who fit a certain set of criteria. Students need to identify which of the three patients would be eligible to enter a trial for the drug.

What you will need

- A printout of the activity sheet (DrugX clinical trial criteria and patient profiles)
- A pen for each group
- A copy of the answers and discussion points

Instructions

- Split the class into groups of 2–3 students
- Give each group an activity sheet
- Talk students through the physiological observations, explaining what the different observations mean
- Ask students to review the DrugX clinical trial criteria against the three patient profiles to identify which patient should be selected (guide time of 10 minutes)
- Once the designated time limit is reached, go through the answers and move on to the discussion points below

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Answers

Patient B is eligible; the highlighted boxes show why the other patients were ineligible.

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Discussion points

After the students have finished, use the opportunity to talk about the activity and how it relates to nursing and midwifery. Some areas of discussion could include:

- What have students learnt from this activity? What does it tell them about a nurse or midwife's job?
- Would they find making this decision difficult? If so, why?
- Can they think of other examples of when a nurse or midwife would need to make difficult decisions?
- The role of a research nurse is diverse. What other things do they think a research nurse would do? For example:
 - Play a vital role in ensuring clinical research studies run smoothly and that participants are safe and fully informed
 - Work with each suitable patient's doctor to provide information to help them decide if they want to take part
 - Support the patient through the decision-making process and if the patient agrees to participate, obtain written consent and enrol them into the trial
 - Arrange the patient's assessments, including treatment, x-rays or scans, taking blood samples, carrying out follow-up visits, collecting all the required data and monitoring their safety and wellbeing
- Which areas of their work might research nurses find particularly rewarding?
